

Her specialization has been T-cells, and their role in Langerhans Cell Histiocytosis, a rare disease of the white blood cells. Jessica won our 7th JKC, and directed a Caldwell-Award winning film for us.



Emmalea Shaw (2017) won our college's sixth Guistwhite Award, a major honor, since only 15-20 are chosen each year nationwide. She was also our college's first Texas Heritage National Bank Scholar, a Caldwell winner, film star, and a published author by her sophomore year. This spring she is presenting at the APTA, the largest physical therapy conference, gaining her doctorate, and getting married--to Ford.



Ann Goodson, the wife of our prolific film composer, Kenny, was with us our first year as a Presidential Scholar. She left something as indelible as any of us--the idea for a worksheet that has been employed every year in honors Texas history. She also helped us with our Shelby film and recent Christmas party, in many capacities.



Mercedes Collins was our 4th Texas Heritage National Bank Scholar. She won our poetry contest, and presented at the East Texas Historical Association, a professional association, as a student here. She helped with the research and acted in our Caldwell Award winning film on Barbara Conrad.



She graduated recently from Grand Canyon University in Phoenix with honors in history, and is pursuing graduate work.



### Fourteenth Time: Noteworthy Metrics. Honors Northeast in Orlando

Conferences are not only idea-sharing events; they are contests that determine the scholars who have the ideas worth sharing. Written abstracts matter, and winsome abstracts, require arresting concepts. Fortunately, at NTCC the scholarly poetry known as conceptualization receives an early-first-semester billing: There is a poetry contest, email concept-with-definition shootouts, concept-generating "ideophanies," and debates featuring interdisciplinary "analogs." In terms of having students qualify for the oldest and most prestigious intervarsity honors council, NTCC on its 14th run, had a larger contingent of qualifying scholars than any other community college in the United States. Also for the first time, NTCC had more presenting student scholars than any university in State of Texas.

The program of the National Collegiate Honors Council in Orlando this year included nine names from NTCC, seven of whom were students. From left to right above, it included:

NTCC's unique film-making tradition won space for an entire panel. The session featured snippets of past work. Director Brian Ramirez, star actor Cade Bennett, film scholar, Israel Perez, and multiple-personality actor, John Rodriguez, provided their perspectives.

All the students who went also presented a scholarly poster, a skill honed each spring at NTCC's McGraw Hill poster contests. Aaliyah Avellaneda presented her double-prize winning work on NTCC's former trustee, and Texas' former Lieutenant Governor, Bill Ratliff. Israel Perez presented on Bo Pilgrim, Maxime Risner on the Decline of Big-Animal Veterinarians, John Rodriguez on Hispanic Quietism, Hilda Rodriguez on Domestic Isolationism, and Cade Bennet on the relation between Texas capitalism and innovation.


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## Our Beneficent Benefactors
