Course Description: RNSG 1301 Pharmacology Credit Hours : 3

Prerequisite(s): None

Student Learning Outcomes:

The Texas State Board of Nurses (BON) provides differentiated essential competencies (DECs) (2010) to guide nursing education programs in developing a curriculum which prepares graduates to provide safe, competent, compassionate care. The Competencies from the BON show the expected level of performance, integrating knowledge, skills, abilities and judgment based upon the preparation in thee program of study. The differentiation is based upon the level of the nursing education program in which the student is enrolled.

The NTCC nursing program director and faculty incorporates the Differentiated Essential Competencies (DECs) (2010) into the student learning outcomes of each course, based on the level of the nursing educational program. The learning outcomes of this course are based on the essential competencies of graduates of Texas Associate Degree nursing education programs.

- 1. Explore basic terms, and principles of drug action related to drug classifications.
- 2. Explore the principles of pharmacokinetics for identified commonly used categories of medications.
- 3. Accurately calculate dosages for commonly used medications through a variety of routes.
- 4. Identify the roles and responsibilities of nursing practice related to administering pharmacologic agents.
- 5. Utilize knowledge of pharmacology to safely administer medications and manage pharmacotherapy.
- 6. Identify adaptations required for pediatric and aging clients related to various drug classifications.
- 7. Discuss the pharmacokinetics, pharmacodynamics, adverse effects, drug/drug or drug/food interactions for major drug categories.

8. Discuss the nursing implications for administration, monitoring, and patient education for major drug categories.

Evaluation/Grading Policy:

This is a nursing course; therefore, you must have a 75 (C) to pass. There is NO ROUNDING GRADES. Grades will be assigned based on percentage earned.

Minimum Technology Requirements:

Students are required to have access to a working laptop computer with a microphone, webcam, and at least 2 GB free space for use during class sessions and for online testing. Students are also required to have access to internet service and not rely on "hot spot" internet as this is also not compatible with testing platforms used.

Course Structure and Overview:

This course is delivered in an online format. The student is expected to complete assignments and course work independently with instructor guidance.

Communications:
