**Course Description:** 3 credit hours.

Topics for this course shall include a study of the nature of criminal law; philosophical and historical development; major definitions and concepts; classification of crime; elements of crimes and penalties using Texas statutes as illustrations; criminal responsibility.

**Prerequisite(s):** Successful completion of CRIJ 1301 Introduction to Criminal Justice

**Student Learning Outcomes:** Explain the historical and philosophical development of the nature of criminal law; describe definitions and concepts of criminal law, classifications of crimes, the elements of offenses and penalties using Texas statutes as illustrations, and discuss criminal responsibilities as they apply to the criminal statutes.
