This syllabus serves as the documentation for all course policies and requirements, assignments, and instructor/student responsibilities.

Course Description:

3 credit hours

Lecture/Lab/Clinical: Three hours of class each week.

Intensive study of practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis. Note: English Composition I is a prerequisite for all 2000-level literature courses.

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of individual and collaborative writing processes.
- 2. Develop ideas with appropriate support and attribution.
- 3. Write in a style appropriate to audience and purpose.
- 4. Read, reflect, and respond critically to a variety of texts.
- 5. Use edited American English in academic essays.

Minimum Technology Requirements: You will need access to a computer to complete the writing assignments for this class. You will be typing your essays and submitting the final draft assignments through Blackboard.

Required Computer Literacy Skills: Blackboard Learning Management System, Microsoft Word processing, average email usage.

Course Structure and Overview: This English composition course is designed to help students develop their critical thinking, research and writing skills. The class will also include reading assignments that challenges students to think and effectively respond both in writing and orally to a variety of reading and visual material. Overall, the goal of this course is to help students grow as thinkers and writers. Higher order skills acquired in thinking and writing help students process information in a rapidly changing world and reflects deeper meanings of print and visual media. Students who utilize rhetorical tools and strategies achieve a level of sophistication in writing that invites audiences to join them in examining issues from multiple layers of meaning. In the process, students begin to take a more disciplined approach to writing and develop their voices through everyday and argumentative writing.

Writing Assignments

Please follow these instructions when writing your papers:

- Writing assignments include a works cited page, must be typed in MLA format
- Use Times New Roman 12 pt. font
- Double-space
- Essay writings are usually two to three pages in length with the exception of the research paper, which is 5 to 7 pages in length.
- Pay close attention to spelling, grammar, and punctuation. Grading rubrics will be provided.
- Due dates for all reading and writing assignments will be assigned during class and will also be noted in the class calendar.
- Essay rough drafts should be printed and brought to class for peer review sessions on the due date. WEPA printing cards can be purchased in the NTCC bookstore. WEPA printers are located in the SUB and in the Learning Commons (Library). The only exception will be when peer reviews are completed online.
- Final drafts will be submitted through a Blackboard Turnitin assignment on the due date.
- Late papers will only be accepted at the instructor's discretion and in emergency situations. Regardless of the reason for being late, papers will not be accepted after three days from the due date and a late penalty of -10 each day will be accessed. <u>After three days, papers will not be accepted for grading.</u>

In-class Writing Assignments

Students will be expected to write on a variety of topics during class time. The work will be generated throughout the semester and submitted through the student's writing journal. Each submission must be original and not the work of previously submitted assignments. Journals will be graded each 4 weeks. Correct grammar, punctuation, and sentence structure should be used within each entry.

Reading Assignments:

Students are expected to read all assigned materials before coming to class. You will be required to respond in writing to readings in your writing journal and orally during class discussions. Failure to read and respond effectively to the reading assignments will affect your grade in the course.

Communications:

Emails will be returned with 24 hours. Please note that NTCC email is the official form of communication used by the college. Emails sent from other accounts will not be answered. Course messaging from Blackboard is accepted as well as Teams. Each student is required to download and access Microsoft TEAMS via your college Microsoft account. The log in for TEAMS is the same as your NTCC credentials. Course announcements will be sent via Blackboard and need to be checked daily.

Institutional/Course Policy:

To complete this course successfully, you should:

- Read all of the textbook assignments
- Participate actively and meaningfully in all group discussions
- Prepare and submit all assignments on time
- Attend class regularly
- Submit only original work, not that generated with the help of artificial intelligence of any type nor be work used by yourself or another previously

Always remember to bring your textbook (or be able to access it via BB), paper and writing utensil to each class. You will be reading material from the textbook and writing in both class and in a writing/reading journal.

Evaluation/Grading Policy:

Your assignments will be evaluated using the following point values:

Essay final drafts assignments	30%
Four peer review and essay rough draft assignments, topic and thesis submission	25%
Reading and Writing Journal	20%
One research essay that includes a Works Cited page	15%
Group participation, syllabus acknowledgement, in class writing assignments, and attendance	10%

Assignments will be graded within two week of receipt or before your next assignment is due. Essays will be graded holistically based on a scoring rubric. It is the expectation that all work submitted be your original work and not work submitted previously or with the assistance of artificial intelligence (AI). Work that is flagged by TurnItIn as having AI content will follow the below grading deduction policy:

 $40\% \ge AI$ content -A grade of 0 on the assignment will be given.

21-39% AI content- A deduction of ½ point for each percentage above 20%. For example, an essay flagged as having 24% AI content will receive a deduction of -12 points on the assignment.

20% or less - No deduction will be taken, but a grading note regarding correction regarding AI content will be made.

Statement Regarding the Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) Technology:

Absent a clear statement from a course instructor, use of or consultation with generative AI shall be treated analogously to assistance from another person (collusion). Generative AI is a subset of AI that utilizes machine learning models to create new, original content, such as images, text, or music, based on patterns and structures learned from existing data (Cornell, Center for Teaching Innovation). Unauthorized use of generative AI tools to complete an assignment or exam is not permitted. Students should acknowledge the use of generative AI and default to disclosing such assistance when in doubt. Individual course instructors may set their own policies regulating the use of generative AI tools in their courses, including allowing or disallowing some or all uses of such tools. Students who are unsure of policies regarding generative AI tools are encouraged to ask their instructors for
